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DRIVING CHANGE IN LITERACY: ILA'S 2025 GLOBAL 30 UNDER 30 LIST ANNOUNCED

NEWARK, Del. (January 13, 2025) — The International Literacy Association (ILA) revealed its 2025 class of 30 Under 30 literacy leaders—a dynamic group of educators, researchers, nonprofit founders, policy advocates and social innovators driving transformative literacy initiatives across 13 countries.

The ILA 30 Under 30 program, established in 2015, highlights rising leaders who are tackling critical literacy issues and championing equitable access to education. The 2025 cohort includes individuals empowering marginalized communities, advancing media literacy and fostering lifelong learning. They join a network of past honorees including Marley Dias, founder of the #1000BlackGirlBooks campaign, Freshta Karim, founder of Charmaghz mobile library in Afghanistan, and Patrick Harris, humanities teacher in Michigan and founder of Good Trouble Media.

"Literacy is more than a skill; it's a pathway to opportunity, equity and empowerment," said ILA Executive Director Nicola Wedderburn. "The young leaders on our 2025 30 Under 30 list exemplify this belief through their groundbreaking work. They are the advocates, educators and innovators redefining what literacy means in an ever-changing world."

Among the honorees:

- **Pashtana Durrani, 27, Founder of LEARN Afghanistan in Kandahar**: An education activist, Durrani's organization provides offline learning solutions to students in conflict zones, ensuring education continues even under the most challenging circumstances.
- Tamara Imali Amatah, 13, Founder of the Student Voice Club in Nairobi, Kenya: At just 13 years old, Amatah has created platforms that empower peers to lead literacy initiatives, fostering journalism and public speaking skills through collaborative projects.
- Uchenna Maximus Emelife, 25, Founder of Book O'Clock in Sokoto, Nigeria: Emelife's organization promotes African literature through book drives, writing contests and an annual literary festival engaging hundreds of children and young readers.
- Olha Kravchenko, 27, Head of Ukraine's Filter Media Literacy Project in Kyiv: Kravchenko combats misinformation by equipping Ukrainians with critical media literacy skills, especially important knowledge amidst war.
- Shane Baker, 29, Third-/Fourth-Grade Teacher in Kentucky, United States: A Milken Educator Award recipient, Baker integrates high-level digital tools such as green screens and coding into project-based learning, fostering critical thinking and creativity among his students.
